Mark Latham

Music Director

Mark Latham received his musical training at the Guildhall School (London), the Philadelphia College of Performing Arts, Brooklyn College Conservatory, and the University of Michigan, where he earned his Doctor of Musical Arts in Orchestral Conducting. Mark was privileged to study with some of the great

musicians and pedagogues of the past century: violin with Masao Kawasaki, Dorothy DeLay and Ithzak Perlman; and chamber music with the Juilliard, Emerson and American Quartets, with Eugene Lehner of the Kolisch Quartet, and Zoltan Zekely of the Hungarian Quartet.

As a violinist, he was a member of the Atlantic String Quartet for 6 years, in St. John's, Canada. He played with Emmanuel Music in Boston, the New England Bach Festival, and with the New Hampshire, Delaware and New Haven Symphonies. He now is a member of the Aryaloka String Quartet.

Mark's primary conducting mentors were Kenneth Kiesler and Marin Alsop, Gustav Meier, Larry Rachlef, and Helmuth Rilling. He has served as music director of several orchestras in Canada, Michigan and New England. In Michigan, he was music director of the Gilbert and Sullivan Society and conducted Dominic Argento's opera "Postcard from Morocco." He conducted the Cabrillo Festival Orchestra in Santa Cruz, CA, and the Oregon Bach Festival Orchestra, as well as those of MIT, the New Hampshire Youth Symphony Orchestra, and the orchestra at Concord Academy. Recently, he directed the premieres of a trilogy of operas in Boston and New Hampshire.

He has given numerous world premieres and his own works have been performed in the US, Canada and the UK including at New York's 92nd St. Y. He is a member 'in absentia' of the Canadian contemporary improv ensemble "The Black Auks" with whom he made several recordings.

Holding a deep belief that music is a broad and powerful educational and social medium for both children and adults, Mark has conducted several youth and community orchestras. The 2018 season included directing the All City Orchestra in Salem, Oregon; conducting the Broadway show Mary Poppins, in Chelmsford, MA; and giving the premiere of a new Requiem by the Vermont composer Robert Griffin. In the summers he conducts and coaches at CAMMAC in Quebec, and at the Iceberg Chamber Music Institute in Newfoundland. In August 2018, he was invited to teach composition and general music at MusicWorks in the UK, a chamber music program for some of Europe's finest young string and piano players. Mark was recently selected as the new Music Director for the Wellesley Symphony Orchestra, the Orchestra-in-Residence at MassBay Community College in Wellesley, MA. The 2022-2023 season will be his first as their former Director is retiring.

Now in his 11th season as Music Director of the New Hampshire Philharmonic, Mark continues to direct the University Orchestra at the University of Massachusetts, Lowell, where he is adjunct professor of conducting, violin and viola.



Aurelia Faidley-Solars

Guest Cello Soloist

Aurelia Faidley-Solars is a 13-year old American cellist who has garnered international attention as a young concert artist. Aurelia currently studies at the Juilliard School of Music and is a 2023-2024 From the Top Fellow. Aurelia is currently the youngest member of Beare's International Violin Society.

Aurelia made her orchestra debut with the Amati Orchestra in

Lausanne, Switzerland, receiving nine curtain calls for her performance of Haydn's Cello Concerto in C Major. She has also performed with the Sempre Musick Symphony in Boston, the Metropolitan Symphony of New York, the Montgomery Symphony in Ohio, the NJ Virtuosi Sinfonietta in New Jersey, and the Manhattan Sinfonietta. As a soloist, Aurelia has appeared in Prague, Vienna, Budapest, and London.

Aurelia is a prizewinner in numerous competitions, including the Fox Valley Concerto Competition in Chicago, the Ambler Symphony Concerto Competition in Philadelphia, the Hill Concerto Competition in NYC, the Sound Symphony Concerto Competition in New York, the Vienna International Music Competition, the CelloWorld Concerto Competition in Vienna, the Petrichor Competition, the Birmingham International Competition in London. She is the youngest prizewinner in the history of The Ronald Sachs International Competition, as well as the two-time New Eastern regionals winner for the Music Teachers' National Association. She was also awarded the prestigious Aaron Rosand Memorial Prize and is the 2023 Menges Scholarship recipient. Aurelia is the youngest finalist in the history for the Artist Presentation Society and was the only student featured in a solo performance celebrating the 130th Anniversary of the New World Symphony, a joint project between the United States and The Czech Republic. Aurelia was the 2023 soloist chosen for the "Young Artists Performers" series in South Carolina, and has toured throughout the northeastern and southeastern United States.

Aurelia is working on her second album with Petrichor Records, due out in Summer, 2023 with the Elgar Cello Concerto in E Minor. At the age of 12, Aurelia released her first album, "From Bach to Summerland" and was reviewed by writer Huntley Dent for New York Classical Review. "She's a wonderfully gifted 12-year-old with remarkable technique and a musical understanding beyond her years. If you wonder how such a young performer might fare in the Elgar Cello Concerto, Faidley puts on her Jacqueline du Pré cap for a passionately felt introduction...".

Aurelia currently studies with Fred Sherry. Her major pedagogical influences include Diego Garcia, her very first teacher, and Hans Jorgen Jensen, her long-time teacher and mentor. She has studied with or appeared in masterclasses with Laurence Lesser, Richard Aaron, Darrett Adkins, Brannon Cho, Phillipe Muller, David Finckel, Ralph Kirschbaum, Amit Peled, Stephen Doane, Rosemary Elliot, Peter Stumpf, Jean-Michel Fonteneau, Clive Greensmith, Matt Haimovitz, Zvi Plesser, Tomasz Strahl, Andres Diaz, Lluis Claret, and Tao Ni, and Pablo Ferrandez. Other major influences include John-Henry Crawford and Zlatomir Fung. In the summer of 2023, Aurelia attended Morningside Music Bridge, a full scholarship program for highly gifted students between the ages of 13-18 where she featured in a number of "Emerging Artists" concerts and masterclasses.

Besides cello, Aurelia is a dedicated ballet dancer, studying in the Pre-Professional division at the School of American Ballet. She has performed featured roles in the New York City Ballet's "The Nutcracker" and "A Midsummer's Night Dream". In 2023, she attended the Royal Ballet School's Summer Intensive Program in London. She loves art of all kinds, singing, and animals. She owns a 1.5 year old crested gecko named "Autumn".

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

Bedřich Smetana's Overture to The Bartered Bride

The evening begins with a vibrant overture to Bedřich Smetana's comic opera, The Bartered Bride. Composed in 1866, the overture encapsulates the effervescent spirit and nationalistic character of the Czech composer. Brimming with folk influences and vivid orchestration, the overture is renowned for its sheer exuberance and infectious melodies.

Vítězslava Kaprálová's Suita Rustica

Next on the program is Vítězslava Kaprálová's Suita Rustica. Kaprálová, a leading 20th-century Czech composer, crafted this rustic suite as an ode to the pastoral life of her native land. Her nuanced layering of orchestration and the frequent use of folk motifs offer a charming snapshot of the Czech countryside. Although her life was tragically short, Kaprálová's distinctive voice and command of the orchestra continue to resonate in this delightful suite.

Josef Suk's Scherzo Fantastique

Josef Suk, a student and son-in-law of Dvořák, carved out his own distinct place in the Czech musical landscape. His Scherzo Fantastique is a magical work, teeming with shimmering orchestral colors, deftly woven melodies, and a touch of the supernatural. This piece brims with effervescent musical imagination and invites the listener into a world of whimsy and enchantment.

Sir Edward Elgar's Cello Concerto in E minor, Op. 85

One of the cornerstones of the solo cello repertoire, Elgar's Cello Concerto carries the audience into the realm of the Romantic era. Elgar, the pre-eminent English composer of his generation, composed this deeply emotional work in the aftermath of World War I, reflecting a mixture of melancholy, longing, and indomitable strength. The concerto is notable for its profound melodic expression and sophisticated interplay between the solo cello and the orchestra.

Antonín Dvořák's Symphony No. 7 in D minor, Op. 70

The concert concludes with Dvořák's towering Symphony No. 7. Composed in 1885 at the height of his creative powers, this symphony is a testament to Dvořák's masterful synthesis of Czech folk elements and the Romantic symphonic tradition. The piece moves from stormy minor-key passion to luminous major-key lyricism, capturing a wide range of human emotions. Through its dramatic arc, the Symphony No. 7 stands as one of Dvořák's most compelling and dramatic works.

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


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
